About Scouting

Did you know Scouting is the largest youth movement in the world? Currently there are almost 60 million Scouts across the world and only a handful of countries without a recognised Scout movement. There are recognised National Scout Organizations and branches in more than 161 countries. Scouting has never stopped growing since its founding in 1907.



Meeting real needs

Scouts are involved in a vast number of issues facing the communities where they live. Scouts work with others in the community to achieve mutual objectives. They work with friends, neighbours, community leaders and other organisations.

Open to all

Scouting is open to all boys and girls, regardless of race or creed, in accordance with the purpose, principles and method conceived by its founder Robert Baden-Powell.

Fun, with a purpose

Through recreation, Scouting achieves its purpose to help young people develop physical, intellectual, social, spiritual, character and emotional aspects of their lives.

Education for life

Scouting complements the school and the family, filling the needs not met by either. Scouting develops self-knowledge, the need to explore, to discover, to want to know. Scouts discover the world beyond the classroom, tapping the skills of others to learn, and passing that knowledge on to others.

Adult Involvement

Adults have a chance to help young people and contribute to the understanding between generations. In their service, adult leaders get valuable training and experience, adding to their personal development.

The Scout Method

Goals achieved by a progressive self-education method:

- 1. Community Involvement
- 2. Learning by Doing
- 3. Nature and the Outdoors
- 4. Patrol System (Small teams)
- 5. Personal Progression (Award scheme)
- 6. Promise and Law
- 7. Symbolic Framework
- 8. Youth Leading, Adult Supporting

The adult contribution to Scouting means many things to many people, but above all it is about service to young people by providing them with a tried and tested program of activities designed to train them to cope with the world as responsible and valuable citizens.

Organisation of a Scout Group

Each Scout Group operates under the guidance and support of a Group Leader. The Group Leader has a responsibility to parents and the Scout Association for the overall management of every facet of the Group, including the delivery of the Scout Program.

The Scout Group is broken down into two major areas, each with a different scope of responsibility. These are the uniformed Leaders and the Group Committee.

Uniformed Leaders

Uniformed (or Section) Leaders do the hands on work each week either at the hall or out and about in the community. They are delivering the Scout Program and the focus of these activities is on development of the youth of the Group. Section Leaders provide the weekly excitement and adventure and during the year run camps and outings for their Section.

All uniformed Leaders at Logan Village Scout Group are **VOLUNTEERS**, giving up their time and energy so that the youth members of the group enjoy exciting programs and activities. They have all undergone an extensive training program before they are allowed to actively supervise your children. For those who deliver the more adventurous aspects of our program they undergo additional specific training and hold VET or Outdoor Recreation qualifications.

Group Committee

The Group Committee is responsible for the management of the group behind the scenes. The Committee is made up of parents of the Group and led by the Group Committee Executive. The Executive is comprised of the Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer and other supporting roles as may be required by the Group. The committee is responsible for resourcing and managing the Group in terms of finances, infrastructure, equipment and Leader recruitment.

Resources such as camping equipment, consumables (pens, paper, glue, ropes, and other craft type materials) for weekly programs and insurances are all necessary for the delivery of the Scout Program. This all costs money and whilst a strategy has been put in place to minimise some of these overheads additional funds are still required and your assistance will be needed from time to time to help raise funds and our expectation is that you will make yourself available to assist.



Where we Meet

Logan Village Scout Group has a Den (as they are known in Scouting) located on Waterford-Tamborine Road, Buccan. It can be accessed from either end of the access road that runs alongside Waterford-Tamborine Road and there is off street parking available to the Den. Entry is through the gate at the front of the car park.



Signing In/Signing Out

As part of the risk management of all our members it is compulsory that all youth members are signed in on arrival at the den and sign out on departure at the end of the night.

Please note that NO youth member is to be dropped off in the car park and left to enter the hall alone. The car park at the hall gets extremely busy, and to help minimise risk to all please ensure you accompany your child into and from the hall.



Youth Sections

Scouting offers a progressive developmental program for our Youth Members. This is spread across five different age ranges, known as Sections. In this way the program caters to the current developmental stages of every Youth Member.

JOEY SCOUTS "Start the Adventure"

Joey Scouts are aged from 5 to 7 years old. By the time they reach their 8th birthday they progress on to the next adventure as a Cub Scout.

A Joey Scout will:

- Discover what challenge means for them
- Explore the world around them
- Start to be active in the community
- Share new adventures with others
- Start to develop outdoor skills
- Discover what teamwork means
- Begin to learn how to lead activities
- Participate in a Unit Council, supported by adults

CUB SCOUTS "Create the Path"

Cub Scouts are aged from 8 to 10 years old. By the time they reach their 11th birthday they progress on to the next adventure as a Scout.

A Cub Scout will:

- Set their own challenges
- Lead some activities on their own
- Give back to their local community
- Become more confident in outdoor skills
- Assist in the running of their Unit Council
- Form long term Patrols
- Develop resilience when faced with challenge
- Talk about what's important to them





SCOUTS – "Explore the Unknown"

Scouts are aged from 11 to 14 years old. By the time they reach their 15th birthday they progress on to the next adventure as a Venturer Scout.

A Scout will:

- Take charge of their own expeditions
- Lead the Unit Council
- Develop more complex outdoor skills
- Support their local communities
- Start to be active in their national communities
- Form teams that last for life
- Build Project Patrols
- Develop their life perspective

VENTURER SCOUTS – "Look Wide"

Venturer Scouts are aged from 15 to 18 years old. By the time they reach their 18th birthday they progress on to the next adventure as a Rover Scout. If they are still in year 12 at school they may stay until the end of the year in which they turn 18.

A Venturer Scout will:


- Take the lead in their Units
- Take on bigger challenges with Scouts from other Units, sections and non-Scouts
- Specialise in areas they're passionate about
- Mentor people with less experience
- Find new communities interstate and overseas
- Help make decisions at more levels of Scouting
- Discover more independence
- Discover their roles in the wider community
- Build resilience and find the meaning of courage in day-to-day life
- Discover the strength of their voice and stand up for what they believe

ROVER SCOUTS – "Beyond the Horizon"

Rover Scouts are aged from 19 to 25 years old. By the time they reach their 26th birthday they leave the movement as a Youth Member. Many Rovers move on to Leadership roles or apply their learnings to furthering careers, exploring the world or taking active roles in their community.

A Rover Scout will:

- Be completely autonomous in their Unit
- Overcome complex challenges
- Refine specialist skills across areas they're passionate
 about
- Build long term relationships as mentors and advisors
- Form the leadership of their section nationally
- Contribute to the leadership of Scouting in Australia
- Refine their global and personal perspectives
- Build personal strength in their voice, ideals and health
- Develop and support their local, national and international communities

Uniform and Badges

Uniform

The Scout uniform consists of a shirt, scarf, woggle and belt. Below the waist is stone, sand or beige long pants, shorts or skirt, and black or brown closed in shoes or joggers.

NO board shorts, denim or camouflage shorts. No thongs for footwear please



The Uniform is very distinctive and each Section of Scouting has its own version. Each Section is identified by the colour of the 'yoke' or shoulder of the shirt. Colours are indicated in the Section paragraphs above.

Uniform is not required for the first few weeks but once you have decided that your son or daughter want to become a 'fully invested' Scout then you will need to purchase a uniform.

Badges.

Upon investiture, a set of badges will be given to a new member to go on their uniform. The placement of these badges is indicated in their section book.

Each section has a system of badges that all youth members can earn. This system is called the Award Scheme and it is intended to encourage young people to strive for a higher level of understanding or expertise over a wide variety of activities.

Most badges are earned by participating in the regular program. This includes camps and various outings that your child's Section go on. Some work involves setting personal goals and working towards that end which can be undertaken outside of the regular meeting nights.

Fees

Scouts Queensland Fees

Enrolment Fee

When initially joining Scouts a once off enrolment fee is charged. This is comprised of an administrative component and a pro-rata membership component based upon the month in which the enrolment was made. The initial joining fee will be invoiced by Scouts Qld with successive renewals being invoiced by the Group and paid to Scouts Qld. Enrolment fees are detailed on the online Enrolment form.

The membership component will cover membership up until the next renewal date.

Branch Membership Renewal Fees

Membership renewal fees are a charge by Scouts Qld but are invoiced and collected by Logan Village Scout Group. This fee covers membership, administration and insurance for your child. It is charged biannually and is due by the 31st of March and the 30th of September each year. Membership needs to be current to participate in Scouting activities.

Logan Village Scout Group Fees

To assist with the function of the Group a term fee of \$80 is charged which is made up of two parts:

Subscriptions (Subs) This fee goes directly to your child's Section to cover the weekly costs for consumables used in activities. Any surplus funds are used to subsidise the costs of camps or other outdoor activities. Subs are currently \$40 per term.
 Group Levy This fee is used by the Group for electricity, maintenance, insurance, Leader training and membership. The Levy is currently \$40 per term

Both of these items will be invoiced directly from the Group prior to the beginning of each term.

Activity Fees

Fees for special activities such as camps, major events or visits to third party providers are charged at cost for each particular activity. Costs for activities will be advised prior to the camp or activity.

Due to the need to purchase food or pay non-refundable deposits it may not be possible to fully refund an activity fee if you withdraw after a certain date.

Fair Play Vouchers

Fundraising

We're a FairPlay activity provider

The fees charged do not fully cover training, insurance, maintenance and costs to equip the sections with camping equipment etc. This is supplemented by fundraising in an effort to keep the out of pocket costs as low as possible.

All families are expected to participate in the fundraising activities of the Group. By raising funds in this manner it will prevent the need for additional levies to be charged or increases in the section subscriptions.

Most of our funds are raised through a small number of activities and events such as sausage sizzles at Bunning's, raffles, chocolate drives, etc, but we are also open to other suggestions anytime.

Your help in this area is vital to the success of the Group.





Special Diets at Camp/Outings

If you child has a requirement for a special diet it may be beneficial for food for a camp or outing be provided by the family. This will help in keeping costs down for the camp/outing and the child concerned will have food that they are used to.

Please ensure that any special dietary conditions are kept up to date in your child's Operoo profile.

Helping Out at Logan Village

Like all volunteer Groups we rely on parents to be involved and be part of their child's Scouting journey. The old adage that "it takes a village to raise a child" has a lot of merit to it.

There are many volunteer jobs within Scouting, such as being a member of the Group Committee working in the background or helping out as one of our Parent Helpers. These are important Scouting jobs but there is no more important or rewarding a role in Scouting as being part of the Leadership team that delivers the Scouting program to our youth.

Being a Leader with Logan Village Scout Group can be very rewarding in lots of ways including the satisfaction of helping young people grow and become active members of our community. It is also a lot of FUN.

Many hands make light work and the more Leaders we have for our Group the lighter the load for all and more importantly the better our programs that we deliver to our youth the more FUN everyone will have.



Volunteering for Scouting is easier than you think. Whether you can spare an hour a month or a day a year, there are hundreds of opportunities both behind the scenes and working with young people. With full support and training, you can experience the fun, friendship and adventure of Scouting for yourself, all on a flexible basis.



What happens from here?

If you have read everything in this manual to this point you deserve a 'cuppa' to consider what you have read. You will need to consider what Scouting can do for your child and how you can be part of their journey at Logan Village Scout Group. Scouting can build leadership in a young person, give them more self- confidence and teach them to become more self-reliant.

What happens next to your child as they enter Logan Village Scout Group?

The first 2-4 weeks is an orientation period where the new child gets to look at the Group and their respective section – to see if this is what they would like to do.

After this they will be invested at a special ceremony. The investiture ceremony is short and sincere. In this ceremony your child will be asked to make a promise to live by the Scout Law and will be welcomed as a fully-fledged member of the Scout Movement. This is a good time to have a camera ready, after all this will only happen once in a lifetime. A uniform is required by the time your child is invested.

After investiture, the Scout participates in the program and progresses through the award scheme for their section. Ask your leader about the award system – this is how they earn badges.

Once nearing (or reaching) the maximum age in a section the youth member then progresses to the next section of Scouting. This process is called linking and they will usually participate in the new Section to get comfortable while still attending their current Section

This is a very important step in a young person's development. This can also be a traumatic time for some; they leave one section where they the big fish in the pond and become the small fish once more. We put a lot of effort into managing this transition to make it as painless as possible.

Where do I go for help?

- Want to discuss the content of the programme or badges? Ask the leaders
- Want to discuss how you can help? See the Group Leader or Group Chairperson
- Want to discuss fees? See the Group Leader or Treasurer
- Don't like what you saw or heard?
 Discuss it with the Group Leader or Section Leader
- Want to volunteer your service? See the Group Chairperson or Group Leader
- Is there anything else you would like to know? Ask the Group Leader or your Section Leader
